Course Content and Objectives:

Students will develop an appreciation and an understanding of the art of dance. They will be exposed to dance masters both past and present. They will be able to describe dance to others in its content, artistic qualities, performance value, and will be able to identify different styles of dance. Students will expand their perception of dance and develop a personal philosophy of their own. They will critique and analyze dance ranging from but not limited to Early Roman dance to present day dance.

SLO: *Identify your own relationship to dance as a cultural phenomenon.

*Analyze and integrate their own artistic standards as they relate to dance *performance and criticism.

*Students will demonstrate a general understanding of history of dance Internationally and in America.

Requirements:

- Asynchronous online course. You must have a working computer to meet the deadlines.
- Please follow instructions. Most Assignments require at least **1-full complete page or more** to fulfill the requirement. Any submission below 1complete page will receive "zero" grade/points.

- Failure to complete Week 1, Week 2 & Week 3 Assignments by the deadline will result in a ***drop*** status. You cannot submit just one, both must be submitted on time or you will be dropped.

3 points will be deducted if you fail to submit any of the following:

1. All emails sent to me must include your full legal name and the title, "Appreciation of Dance.
2. If you chose to add a profile picture, only registered students should provide an appropriate headshot as a business facepic for the "Profile page". No family members, animals, cars, animation, **absolutely "NO" body parts**, sexualized poses or inappropriate facial expressions such a "ducklips" or you will lose points.
3. All materials handed in must have legal names for grading purposes and course title.
4. Absolutely No handwritten will be accepted.

5. No late papers will be accepted.

All Assignments must be legible or you will not receive credit and may *fail* the course.

MLA Format is required.

[Follow the MLA Sample page.pdf](#) exactly for Week 2-Final. *3 points will be deducted for each MLA requirement that is not applied:*

1. Include all "headings" and "title".
2. Indent 1/2" space before each paragraph.
3. Double-space after each paragraph.
4. Leave 1" margins on the top, bottom and each side. Quotes longer than four lines should be written as a block of text a half inch from the left margin.
5. Spellcheck
6. Submit all assignments to Canvas.
7. Submit all assignments in PDF to canvas before deadline. Do not ask for extensions.

MLA stipulates a 1/2" indentation. Depending on which font and font size you use, that gives a variable number of space characters. For example, a paper with 10 spaces will be flagged for not enough indentation even though you may submit more than the 7 spaces. Depending on font and size, you need 12 to be correct and hit the 1/2" mark. If you use a default Ariel 11pt font of Google Docs, that is also 12 spaces to hit 1/2", but need 13 spaces to hit it when using Arial 10. Indent 1/2"

To achieve "double-spacing" throughout the entire submission, the paragraph extra-spacing usually requires a side-by-side cut and paste.

- o What is academic dishonesty?

The two most common kinds of academic dishonesty are cheating and plagiarism.

Cheating is the act of obtaining or attempting to obtain credit for academic work through the use of dishonest, deceptive or fraudulent means, such as

- A.I. Artificial Intelligence is prohibited and will become an automatic "F" and you will be dropped from this course.
 - Copying, in part or in whole, from someone else's test
 - Copying
 - Submitting work presented previously in another course, if contrary to the rules of either course
 - Altering or interfering with grading
 - Using or consulting any unapproved sources or materials during an examination, including consulting with other students, or using electronic equipment such as cell phones, unless authorized by the instructor
 - Committing other acts that defraud or misrepresent
- Plagiarism is representing the work of someone else as your own. This may include
- Incorporating the ideas, words, sentences, paragraphs, or parts of another person's writings without giving appropriate credit, and representing the product as one's own
 - Representing another's artistic or scholarly works such as musical compositions, computer programs, photographs, paintings, drawings, choreography, or sculptures as your own
 - Submitting a paper purchased from a research or term paper service, including the internet

- Undocumented use of internet sources

Other examples of academic dishonesty include

- Purposely allowing another student to copy from your paper during a test
- Giving homework, term paper or other academic work to another student to plagiarize
- Having another person submit any work in your name
- Lying to an instructor or college official to improve your grade
- Altering graded work after it has been returned, then submitting the work for re-grading
- Stealing tests
- Forging signatures on drop/add cards or other college documents
- Collaboration without permission of instructor
- Gaining unlawful or unauthorized access to college or district computers or servers

Consequences of Academic Dishonesty

Academic and/or administrative sanctions may be applied in cases of academic dishonesty.

- Academic consequences may include
- Receiving a failing grade on the test, paper or exam
- Having course grade lowered
- Receiving a grade of F in the course

Administrative consequences may include

- Disciplinary probation
- Disciplinary suspension
- Expulsion

Students may also be subject to arrest or monetary fines if the academic dishonesty offense violates state or federal law.

Student Records

The Student Development & EOPS Office maintains a record of students who have engaged in academic dishonesty. This information is used to identify and discipline students reported for academic dishonesty more than once.
